SNY Neurosurgeons Completes HEAL 1 Project

This month, the Southern New York Neurosurgical Group completed their HEAL 1 project to install the NextGen electronic medical record (EMR) system. All neurosurgeons have been trained in the electronic medical record and have been incorporating it into their daily schedules at a steady rate. Their efforts at this point are to simplify and learn to use the system more efficiently for their practice's needs. The NextGen system is extensive in what it offers, and SNY Neurosurgeons providers are currently learning to use the EMR system to its highest potential in order to better serve their patients.


UMA NextGen EMR Interoperability Pilot

Also this month, providers at UMA sites that are utilizing the NextGen EMR system will be piloting the automated flow of clinical patient data (for their patients who have provided consent) from the STHL Health Information Exchange (HIE) into their NextGen EMR system. When pulling up a patient's electronic record, providers will see not only clinical information that originated from that office, but also rich clinical data from other providers that patient may have seen in our region who are contributing information to the STHL HIE. Doctors will be able to get a more complete view of their patient's health which helps them make good decisions about their care.

Consent Campaign Update

STHL's consent campaign went into full gear during February and March. United Medical Associates practices began collecting STHL HIE consent forms from patients February 1st and presently collection is underway at each of the 45 practices slated for collection. Lourdes hospital, too, has begun collection. Now, patients visiting the hospital for outpatient services are being invited to participate in the STHL health information exchange. The next sites in STHL's consent campaign include central registration at Wilson Memorial, Binghamton General and Chenango Memorial Hospitals, hospital clinics and family care centers associated with Chenango Memorial Hospital and Lourdes Hospital's primary care network and other practices. STHL currently processes about 1,000 forms a week. We're well on our way!
